Welcome to 2016. 2015 was an excellent year for the PUD by any measure. We started work on the strategic plan, including 11 new projects underway as a result of the Public Power Benefit program. We paid down more debt and are on course to get below a 35 percent debt ratio by the end of 2018 – a

full year earlier than we predicted. And we are making important investments in our people and our facilities. You will hear more about these throughout the year. We are optimistic about the future, and we are investing now in our revenue-generating projects to ensure that the District's good fortune continues for years to come.

Yet, like many of you, we worry about the shutdown of Alcoa's Wenatchee Works plant. The PUD is actively engaged with other community partners to identify how best to respond in the short-term, while working on a plan should the situation turn into a permanent closure. We haven't given up on the potential for a re-start.

And, following up on one of the things we heard from you during strategic planning was a desire to expand our fiber services to more parts of the county. Lighting the way

We're taking a look at all the street and area lights in Chelan County that are powered by the PUD as a first step toward consideration of installing LED lamps.

Contractor Tanko Lighting will spend about three months on the lighting inventory. The results will be used to evaluate potential energy savings and test cost effectiveness of converting to Light Emitting Diode (LED) lamps.

We also are working with manufacturers to evaluate LED lamps. Sample lights will be installed in two areas of Wenatchee in February - along Cashmere Street and in and around Washington Park.



This GE street light is similar to what will be tested in Wenatchee neighborhoods.

Benefits of LED lighting include lower energy use and costs, less maintenance, better visibility for safety and less stray lighting so areas are "Dark Sky" compliant. LEDs provide "white light" which makes it easier to see true color at night.
