
Proposed Fees

Metering/Monitoring	\$1,400
Investigation/Enforcement	\$2 <i>,</i> 000
Residential Security Deposit	\$1,000
Residential Equipment Degradation	\$1,750
Commercial Equipment Degradation (Overhead Service)	\$4,700
Commercial Equipment Degradation (Underground Service)	\$8,000

Implementation Plan

- Fees will be assessed in stages
- This provides customer an opportunity for compliance
- If safety risks are identified, service will be disconnected and all applicable fees will be assessed
- Unauthorized services may be referred to local/state authorities for further prosecution





Recent Challenges

- Average ~2-3 suspected unauthorized services discovered daily
- Evaluating application information
 - Incomplete
 - Inaccurate claiming no HDL
 - Multiple/false names used
 - Multiple locations
- Lengthy complaints/arguments from applicants due to enforcement
- Compliance temporary at times

Fee Amnesty Period For customers who self report, with no history of HDL use or suspected use

- Limited eligibility
- Must agree to shut down
- Provides waiver of meter fee unless use continues
- Timeline options:

#1	No amnesty
#2	2 week period
#3	Until May 14

- Will require reduced monitoring to ensure compliance
- Extensive communication efforts planned to heighten customer awareness
