- Day 15 of the session
- 890 bills introduced as of Jan. 19 (1074 bills in 2021)
- Virtual session workable but with some challenges
- Last day of session March 10
- Anticipate ending on time

 Sen. Shelly Short (R-Addy) is the new Ranking Member on the Senate Energy Environment and Technology Committee



Top 2022 Legislative Issues - Recap

- Federal funding allocations from coronavirus and infrastructure laws
- Gov. Inslee climate package
- Telecom funding and policy changes
- Wildfire liability



Top 2022 Legislative Priorities (based on bill introductions)

- SB 5803 Wildfire liability
- HB 1931 Water power license fees
- Salmon protection and restoration
 - HB 1838/SB 5727 Salmon habitat
 - HB 1653 Improving statewide coordination to support salmon recovery
 - HB 1717 Tribal participation in local planning



Energy Issues

- HB 1767/SB 5666 Targeted electrification of buildings
- HB 1774/SB 5722 Reducing greenhouse gas emissions in buildings
- HB 1814 Community solar for targeted customers
- SB 5744 Tax deferrals/credits for clean technology, alternative fuels and renewable energy storage



Telecom Issues

- HB 1723 Telecommunications access (digital equity)
- HB 1673/SB 5580 Public Works Board grants and loans
- HB 1740/SB 5586 CERB authorities for funding for broadband



Human Resources & Safety

- HB 1732 Long-term care program delay cleared the House on Jan. 19
 - Scheduled for Ways and Means hearing Jan. 24
 - Premiums would be collected beginning July 1, 2022
 - Includes other changes
- HB 1733 Long-term care program amendments on same track
- Numerous others bills to repeal and modify the long-term care act not likely to be heard



Other Issues

- \$100M in funding for utility customer arrearages in the governor's budget
- Governor's operating budget includes \$350,000 to analyze options to replace the benefits of lower Snake River dams
