

Chelan PUD 2017 Legislative Update January 16, 2017

- 1. Centennial Grant funding for the Peshastin project
 - a. Issue Upgrades to the wastewater plant to meet State mandated environmental requirements.
 - b. Need We are seeking grant funding. (60% of project costs)
 - c. Gov. Inslee's budget includes \$50M for Centennial Grants (a portion of which is for hardship projects such as the Peshastin project No.2 on the list)
- Gov. Inslee Carbon Tax bill has been introduced helps fund infrastructure spending
 a. SB 5127 Sen. John Braun, R-Centralia and Sen Kevin Ranker, D-Orcas Island
- 3. Public Works Trust Fund
 - a. There are now three bills on infrastructure spending
 - i. HB 1051 Rep. Richard DeBolt, R-Chehalis
 - ii. SB 5033 Sen. Karen Keiser, D-Kent
 - iii. SB 5088 Sen Jim Honeyford, R-Sunnyside (OFM Request Bill)
 - iv. Rumors of two additional bills
- 4. Fuel Mix Disclosure
 - a. Issues
 - i. Current methodology inaccurately assigns too much carbon to the energy we use to serve load
 - ii. Other legislative proposals use it to assign carbon content Gov. Inslee's Carbon Tax bill relies on the disclosure for utilities carbon reporting
 - b. Needs
 - i. Modify the current process to openly and accurately reflect fuel sources
 - ii. Do not use to assign carbon obligations to utilities
- 5. Distributed Generation and distribution system planning
 - a. Issue There will likely be a push for the expansion of distributed generation and a re quirement to perform related distribution system planning
 - b. Need Maintain Local Control, allow for individual needs of utilities to be served through our system planning processes currently in place
 - c. Rep Morris has released a draft of his distributed energy resources bill staff is reviewing but we understand the bill is intended to provide carrots instead of sticks to encourage utilities to plan for the future.







- a. Issues
 - i. SAO imposed restrictions on unit priced contracts
 - ii. Requirement to use an auditing standard that we feel is not needed and adds costs and may be incompatible with bond and power agreements
- b. Needs
 - i. Retain our ability to continue efficient unit price contracting (tree trimming, paving)
 - ii. Do not make chances to current audit regulations
- c. The PUD unit price contracting bill has been dropped and the hearing on the bill is Jan 17. Coordinating with staff and WPUDA on how to support the bill.
- 7. Retail telecom authority
 - a. Issue Current law prohibits PUDs from serving existing customers in the event the retail service provider is unable to do so
 - b. Need legislate a "Safe Harbor" provision to allow continued customer service
 - c. Sen. Rolfes has dropped her bill.
- 8. Pole attachments (Including wireless equipment)
 - a. Issue There may be an effort by service providers to standardize rates across the state
 - b. Need No change is needed; we support the current rate setting methods and regulations
 - c. A workshop on 5G technology was held last week. The wireless providers want to attach their equipment to utility poles, public buildings, light standards, and other infrastructure in a right-of-way. The barebones version of the bill apparently would preempt local authority related to regulating the right of way and the charges local governments impose for facilities attached to their property.
- 9. Other issues of note
 - a. Sen. Hawkins has been elected Assistant Floor Leader
 - b. Sen. Hawkins is seeking funds for construction of the Emergency Operations Center at the Sunnyslope fire station. Site work and design of facility was funded last year.

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
